(Greek nomos / -nomia) law, arrangement / body of knowledge

ex <b>patri</b> ate*	- to act by () going or being sent out () of one's father's () or one's own native country; one who lives in a foreign country or has been exiled
<b>patri</b> mony*	- an estate or a <u>quality</u> () that is inherited from one's <u>father</u> () or ancestors
patriotism*	- the practice of () having the condition of ()  loyalty to one's father's () or one's native country
<b>patr</b> onym <b>ic</b>	- <u>pertaining to ()</u> a <u>name ()</u> derived from a <u>father</u> () or paternal ancestor; e.g. Williamson
re <b>patri</b> ate	- to act by () sending someone back () to his father's () or his own native country
alter <b>ego</b>	- <u>the other ()</u> side of one's <u>self</u> (); an inseparable friend or companion
<b>ego</b> ism*	- the doctrine that () all human behavior is motivated by self- () interest
egoist*	- <u>a person who</u> () is <u>self</u> - () centered and devoted to his own interest and advancement
<b>ego</b> the <b>ism</b>	- the practice of () thinking of oneself () as a god ()
super <b>ego</b>	- the Freudian term for the part of the mind that operates <u>beyond</u> () the conscious <u>self</u> (); the agent of self-criticism
a <b>nom</b> y	- the condition of () being without () laws (); social instability caused by erosion of values
anti <b>nom</b> y	- the condition of () having laws () that work against () each other; paradoxical principals
auto <b>nom</b> y*	- <u>the state of () making one's own () laws</u> (): independence
gastro <b>nom</b> y*	- the <u>body of knowledge</u> () concerning good eating and regulating the <u>stomach</u> () with food
taxo <b>nom</b> y*	- the <u>body of knowledge</u> () concerning the <u>arrangement</u> () of organisms by classification
